What? Oh. My bad.

Well... To be fair, Passover is discussed in this week's torah reading; kind of.

You see, way back when, part of the Passover service was the "Korban Pesach", the sacrifice of a lamb which was then eaten as part of the seder. Every Jew participated, and had a great big BBQ. There were a few people who could not fully observe the Passover holiday because they were "impure" and because of that were disqualified from eating this lamb. What makes someone impure? Coming into contact with a corpse, a person who is no longer alive.

Now that's strange, isn't it? As a general rule, humans are cleaner than animals (with some notable exceptions), and certainly if a body is clean there should be nothing 'contaminated' about it.
