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They were afraid to go to Israel, which was a huge lack of faith on their part, and lots of badness and sadness followed.


Then they decided they wanted to go to Israel. Moses said no. A group of them decided to go anyway.

HOMESTRETCH

- As the fifth book of the Torah (out of five), Devarim, AKA Deuteronomy gives a partial review of the Jews' 40 years in the desert. Kind of a "Last time on Jews in the Desert..."
- Moses speaks to the entire nation, near the end of his life. It's basically his extended last will and testament
- Mention is made of the appointment of judges to help Moses judge and adjudicate and a-jew-dicate
- We recall how the Jewish people sent spies to scout out Israel, believed a bad report and got grounded for 40 years
- As a result every Jew of age passed away in the desert with the exception of Joshua and Caleb
- In traveling toward Israel they avoided the lands of Edom, Amon and Moab, but had a war with the two great kings, Sichon and Og, who were angry because their parents gave them terrible names
- Joshua is named as the successor to Moses who would actually bring the Jewish people into Israel
- Moses gives Joshua encouragement, telling him to be strong and bold


Torat Scene-A-Eye Explained


Dear SimiCha,

Here's a grammar question for you: The plural of mouse is mice, the plural of fish is fish, and the plural of cactus is cacti. So what is the plural of rabbit?


Rabbi.

If you'd asked me this question when I was a kid I might have told you a Rabbi is someone with a big beard. Now that I've learned more, I know that some great Rabbis have medium beards. So a Rabbi is someone with a truly painful sense of humor. Alright, I'll answer your question now.

The word Rabbi comes from the term "great" and no, it's not just referring to beard size. The original Rabbis were certainly people who earned that term- great scholars, leaders and moral giants. The process of what it takes to become a Rabbi has changed several times over the generations. Way, way, way back when Moses was ready to pass the torch to the next generation, he leaned his hands on his stu-

scholars who identify as Rabbis without 'official' ordination, most 21st century Rabbis have gone to a Rabbinical school where they have studied and tested on a variety of important subjects. Generally to become a Rabbi you have to have a pretty good handle on halacha (Jewish law), gemara (talmudic study), chumash (biblical study) and mussar (personal lessons from the Torah). Often, expertise in Kosher laws, customs and rules of marriage and legal disagreements is included in a modern semicha program. Although there are

many different specific types of programs for semicha, the original concept still applies- Rabbinical ordination means that the person receiving it is worthy of a leadership position within the Jewish people. Of course, some people just become Rabbis because they're great pickle experts. I won't name names.
