#### The Badness Index

Who do you think is the most evil villain in history? Voldemort? sauron? Papa smurf? Thanos? Pharaoh? Haman? Black licorice?

I searched this question online and someone suggested God in the Torah. Hey, if you're that person, let's grab a coffee and talk about it. The truth is that evil comes in many shapes and sizes.

Reading through this week's Parsha, I found something to be very confusing. Abraham wants his son Isaac to get married, so

he sends his trusted servant and student, Eliezer to scont out a good wife for him. He gives very specific instructions that he should go to Abraham's relatives in distant Charan, rather than giving any thought to the local girls. OK. Here's where it gets interesting. He makes Eliezer take a sacred vow specifically not to choose Isaac a wife from the local, Canaanite nations. This sounds a little extreme. He already gave the instruction to look in Charan. It would appear that Abraham either really, really, really did not like his neighbors (did they

source of wonderful people. Which one was it? I'll give you a hint. God had instructed Abraham to leave his homeland and travel to Canaan, at least in part because the people of Charan were a terrible influence! So assuming both locations were pretty low on the character scale, why were the Cannanite better to have as neighbors, and the Charanites better to marry? Don't tell me that Abraham's relatives were better than the average resident of Charan. Besuel and Laban were really rotten dudes!

I'm not here to tell you what kind of evil is the most nefarious, egregious, flatigious, heinous, atrocious, villainous, repugnant, maleficent or badder. Yet there is a difference between different types of evil. The evil of Canaanites was based on character flaws. They were immoral, not because of an incorrect belief, but because they were bad people. Abraham's relatives in Charan were terrible, but their evil was due to thought. They believed wrongly and acted based on those

years to keep working on ourselves. Vet,


