### #144 Science Less-sun

Last week we started to do a several week series on questions about The Creation. Enjoy, and don't forget to ask!

Dear Rabbi,

Let there be light! Right? That's what God said on the first day. Then, on the fourth day of creation, God created the sun. I don't understand. If the creation story actually happened the way the Torah says, how can the sun have been created AFTER light already existed? Confused.

Thanks. Naomi Astrovsku Dear Astro, Naomi,

I think this answer will make for some light reading... ouch. OK. Actually, it won't. This is a bit of a complicated discussion, but, hey, you asked the question so it's your fault. Hang onto uour broomstick!

Your question is an old, old one. For thousands of years, people have asked this question. The Talmud itself



discusses it, and here are a few approaches to answer this question based on the Talmud's foundation. One common opinion is that the sun, as the source of light in the universe, did indeed come into existence on the very first day of creation, even before the Earth. The Torah's mention of the sun's creation on the fourth day means that was when the sun (and the solar system, presumably) was firmly set into its proper orbit and fixed position. It is also possible in this approach that there was some sort of fog, cloud or other nebulous obstruction... wait, is this supposed to be a kid friendly publication? There was stuff blocking the sun till the 4th day. This also fits with the approach that even though the basis of plantlife was created on the 3rd day, plants didn't actually grow until later.
