#170 Not For Prophet

Hi Rabbi,

When a prophet makes a prediction about the future, does it have to come true? It makes sense that it should, but that's a little scaru. Aren't there some pretty frightening prophecies about future wars and terrible things that will happen? Do those have to come true?

Dear Navi.

You must know that the Torah is the all time best selling book in the world. That makes it a very prophetable publication! Prophecy is one of the most misunderstood concepts there is, and perhaps one of these weeks we'll start a series about it. For now, here's the info you need to get your auestion answered:

It makes sense that all prophecies should have to come true or else not be a prophecy. If you walk into a burger restaurant, order a burger and they serve you a salad, they're clearly failing at their purpose (or else your mom told them they better serve you veggies). Well, what is a prophet's purpose? The Hebrew word for prophet is 'Navi' which literally means 'speaker'. A prophet's job is to communicate God's message to people. Here's where it gets tricky. HOW DO 40U KNOW that the supposed message from God is actually divine? Maybe the prophet is a liar trying to tell you what he wants you to think God said! This is a real concern, and the Torah talks about it quite a bit. One of the main ways to determine that a prophet is legit is for them to make a prediction about the future. If a supposed prophet can predict something pretty unlikely and they do it accurately, that proves that they have access to divine knowledge (BTW, predicting something obvious or something vague doesn't prove anuthing- it has to be specific and unpredictable).

But what happens if the prophecy doesn't come true?

If a prediction doesn't come true, then it really isn't much of a prophecy, is it? According to the consensus of traditional Jewish philosophy texts (that was a mouthful. I guess I coulda just said, "Most rabbis say") any positive prophecy (like "I will take you out of Egypt") must come true. However if a prophecy is about a negative thing happening, like wars or

punishments, that doesn't always come true. An example of this is the prophet Jonah who delivered a prophecy about the destruction of Nineveh, which never happened. Negative prophecies are meant to inspire people to change. In the case of Nineveh, there was a city-wide transformation, people became better and

therefore the tragedies did not occur. You're worried about the apocalyptic prophecies of the future. The good news is that since they're negative prophecies they don't absolutely have to happen, if people change and become better.
