When I came to the Shabbaton, I sat down at my host's house and started playing the piano, but someone told me I shouldn't play on Shabbat. I don't understand why not. Isn't music important for Shabbat and praying and stuff? They said 'cause I might fix it. But I have no idea how to fix a piano! Duct tape? Please explain.

Dear Simphonic Man,

You must be a good musician, because when I play, people try and BREAK the piano, not fix it! You're also asking a really good and thoughtful question, because you're right; music was and still is a huge part of prayer and Shabbat! When our holy temple stood in Jerusalem, every service was accompanied by Levites playing musical instruments (Levite is not simply the Jewish version of evite, it's a group of people who are the descendants of Levi, son of Jacob). Many of our prayers involve singing, and if you've indeed been to a Nageela Shabbaton, you'll know that singing is a massive part of Shabbat! So why do we skip instruments on Shabbat? Wouldn't it add so much to the musical experience?

People are spaced out. Hellloooo-o-o, are you listening to me? Yeah. My point exactly. We tend not to pay too much attention to what we're doing, and then do things we had not planned to do. How many times have you walked into a room to get something, and then you can't remember what it is you wanted? Come on, you can admit it to me. Or you're looking for your glasses for like an hour, and then realize you've been wearing them.

Just the other day, I picked my son up from school, and was driving him to an appointment that started at 2pm. At 2pm I sharp, we pulled up... into the driveway of my house! We walked inside and then I was like, "Wait. We're not supposed to be here." People do this kind of thing all the time! Imagine you are playing the guitar, let's say, and you're

really getting into the groove of the music (in case some of readers are not familiar with the word 'music', it's that thing people used to listen to before rap was invented). Then one of your strings gets out of tune, or snaps. You will likely fix it, or tune it, without even thinking! Therefore, people who keep Shabbat are careful not to play musical instruments, in order to make sure they don't absentmindedly do some repairs.

The second part of your question is awesome, too. Everything I've written is about tuning or fixing an instrument... what if you have no clue how to tune or fix an instrument? Any musician can tune a guitar, or adjust the reed on a saxophone, or pull the cat's tail to a different rhythm.

I've got no clue how to tune a piano, or drums. I wouldn't know the first thing about repairing a tuba, if I could even pick it up. So what could be the problem with playing those on Shabbat?

I will answer that question... next week, my friend... next week.

BTW, has anyone seen my computer? I need it to type up this Stump the Rabbi, and I can't seem to find it anywhere!
