

Dear Bay B,

No. Not true.

Well that was simple, wasn't it? Well it's at least half untrue. Did that make it clearer? Not good enough? Here we go.

Some religions preach that people are naturally bad and need to be saved. That people can not follow the path to goodness on their own, and need to borrow credit from some heavenly bank account. Not shellfish.

we mature we learn to (I mean we are SUPPOSED to learn to) think about others, make wiser decisions and be good. To fight against the negative forces within us.

The Talmud also tells us that the challenges of this world are so difficult that we need God's help to succeed. The difference is OUR choice. We have

the ability and the obligation to make the choices, on our own, to be good. Once we make those choices, God will help us overcome all the difficult challenges the world throws at us.

So don't be depressed. You're not evil. I'll take it even one step further. In some ways humans can be considered holier than angels. Even though angels are perfect, and humans are far, far from perfect (with some notable exceptions), our success makes us greater. If an angel is awesome, big whoop. They were made that way. If a person is awesome... Now that is something special.
