ALL THAT'S LEFT

Last week, we featured this question. Because it's a big topic, we've decided to split it up into a two week segment. Last week's topic was when and why Jewish practice insists on things being done with one side or the other. This week we focus on lefties, how they're the same and how they're different.

Hi Rabbi,

Right side? Wrong side? I learned that I use my right hand to cover my eyes for shema even though I'm a lefty. But I also learned that I should hold a cookie in my left hand to make a blessing. Why are they different? Come to think of it, why do we do things with specific hands at all? Why does it matter? Thanks.

When I was a teenager, I had a tee shirt that said, "If the right side of the brain controls the left side of the body, then only lefties are in their right minds!" BTW, I'm a lefty...

Although the tee shirt's slogan was a joke, the truth is, there's something special about us. A shocking percentage of US presidents have been lefties, and a disproportionate number of Nobel Prize winners.

In biblical literature, we're first introduced to lefties in the form of Ehud, a great leader of the Jewish people living about 3,000 years ago, predating our Jewish kings and holy temples. The Jewish people, at the time, were being persecuted by a tyrant named Eglon, who was the king of Moab (wait... the Jewish people being persecuted? Has that ever happened before?). Ehud wanted to get rid of Eglon, but the king was too heavily guarded. Then he had an idea. He trained himself as a left handed swordsman, and was able to hide the sword on the right side of his body, where the royal guards didn't search very carefully. He rid the world of Eglon and rescued our nation from an oppressor. As a kid, I always liked that story for two reasons. One, or course, is that, as a lefty, I felt proud of 'lefty power' that prevailed. The second is that the name Eglon sounded like eggroll to me. I dunno. I'm always thinking about food. I like eggrolls.

In last week's discussion, we spoke about specific expectations in Jewish life that are done properly with the right or the left hand (but mostly the right). Today we'll discuss how lefties

fit in to these expectations.
Are we lefties supposed to use

our right hands like everyone else, or should we focus on our left side (and right mind)? The answer is, it depends (of course that's the answer; that's always the answer... but what does it depend on? That also depends...).

As we discussed last week, there are a few different reasons why Jewsh law or custom would choose the right or the left side. Depending on what the reason is, that will determine what lefties do. Would you believe there's a book written just to explain this? Jewish law is very detail oriented. Here's an example:

The reason we lean on our left side while eating matzah on Passover is because of the way our body is built. It's healthier to lean on the left side than the right side. In this case, the same applies to lefties, so righties and lefties would be the same. On the other hand, when it comes to things where the right hand is used because it's 'more important,' the Ashkenazi custom would be to follow whichever hand is more important to you, subjectively. Therefore a lefty would hold the lulav in his or her left hand, instead of the right, because to a lefty, the left hand is more important.

In Tree Stump, we'll show more examples of which practices left is right, and which ones, right is... oh, never and.
