

THE PRINCESS BRIDE

Once there was a girl named Tim. Actually, her name was Timna, and she's mentioned in the Torah. You see Timna was a princess who became a bride, sort of.

Let's start over again. The Talmud tells the story of a Chori princess named Timna. Timna became interested in joining the family that would later become the Jewish nation, and she visited our forefathers, looking to convert. She went to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, all three, and she had her application denied. She really wanted to join our holy nation but she could not, so she decided to do what she viewed as the next best thing. She decided to marry Eliphaz, the son of Esav. Yet Eliphaz wasn't taking applications either, so she became a concubine, which is basically a fake wife. She so wanted to be co enacted to our nation that even obtaining a lessthan-respectable position in a less-thanrespectable branch of the family was exciting for her, a princess.

This in itself is amazing. So many people are obsessed with celebrities; with people who actually bring very little value to the world. A thinking person will recognize that only moral clarity brings value to the world, and connecting to a family that represents that moral clarity is worth more than any fame or wealth. BTW, Eliphaz, despite being the son of Esav was a somewhat decent dude.

taught people about the One and Only God, and inspired them to serve Him. Why, why, why, WHY would Abraham turn her away???

There are a number of approaches to this. Some say that Abraham detected she wasn't sincere. Some suggest that she came from an inappropriate marriage. But honestly, it's hard to see how that answers the question. If she deserved to be accepted, then why did Abraham reject her? If Abraham had a good reason to reject her, then why do we have to suffer at the hands of her descendants?

I want to point to the wording of the Talmud, "She wanted to convert, so she came before Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and they did not accept her... Amalek, who antagonizes Israel, came from her. What is the reason (the Jews deserved that punishment)? Because they should not have distanced her."

Do you see it? Our ancestral triumvirate didn't accept her. OK. But what's the reason for the punishment? Talmud does not say it's because



didn't accept her. It says it's because they shouldn't have DISTANCED her. I believe the Talmud is telling us that OF COURSE our ancestors did not have to accept all converts, and she didn't make the cut. But that isn't a reason to distance her. Perhaps there is something they could have done to keep her connected to the source of morality that became the Jewish people. Perhaps had she been allowed to connect in some secondary way, she would never have produced an offspring like Amalek. Perhaps we can all learn a lesson from this.

There will be people who will climb to the heights of awesometasticness, and some won't make it. Yet even those who aren't where they should be must be allowed to gain whatever they can from a connection to the universe's true source of goodness. "Don't be dismissive of any person."

a brief summary of the weekly torah porshon

PARSHAS <u>VAY</u>ISHLACH- Brotherly Love

- DON'T YOU LOVE FAMILY REUNIONS? I LOVE THEM, ESPECIALLY WHEN ONE BROTHER IS SWORN TO KILL THE OTHER (UNLESS THAT BROTHER HAPPENS TO BE ME. THEN I DON'T LIKE THE REUNIONS SO MUCH)
- JACOB IS ABOUT TO MEET HIS BROTHER ESAV AFTER DECADES, AND IS AFRAID. HE PREPARES HIMSELF IN THREE WAYS. HE SENDS ESAV A SIZEABLE AMAZON GIFT CARD (IN THE FORM OF HUNDREDS OF ANIMALS), HE PRAYS, AND HE ALSO SPLITS HIS FAMILY UP, GETTING 2 SEPARATE AIRBNBS
- WHILE MOVING HIS FAMILY, JACOB CROSSES OVER A RIVER TO GRAB SOME OF HIS LUGGAGE THAT HE LEFT BEHIND (HE WAS FLYING FRONTIER) AND HE WRESTLES WITH AN ANGEL REPRESENTING ESAV. Hi Rabbi,

Why are there different letters and vowels in Hebrew that sound the same? What's the point? And why do people pronounce Hebrew words differently?



Dear Dvfjrgjdofbk

Have you ever heard of the language called English? English is just about the most confusing, illogical language possible. PH=F, vowels can mean different things at different times... Hebrew also has some confusing components, but overall is a lot simpler, and there are good reasons, not arbitrary ones, for the complexities. My point is that almost all languages have some inconsistency in spelling or pronunciation. The reason for that is twofold: Time and location. As time passes and speakers of a language move from one area to the next, meeting different ethnicities, experiencing new realities, things about the language will start to change. Why do you think American English and Shakespearean English are so vastly different? Wither shalt thou knowest?

Although Hebrew has been the language of our people for thousands of years, and I have no doubt that when God spoke to us at Sinai, He used proper grammar, century upon century of Jews moving around and living in different lands have greatly changed pronunciations. You maynotice that Jewish communities of European descent pronounce Hebrew with a rather European sound, as a Jew from Texas may have a bit of a drawl while praying. Sephardic Hebrew pronunciation sounds similar to Arabic. And so, over many generations, we've forgotten which pronunciations are accurate, and we don't seem to have any digital backup of "King David's Greatest Hits" in mp3 format.

One of the greatest examples of this is the SHABBAT/SHABBOS debate. In Hebrew, it's written . Depending on how you pronounce the vowel and the letter, it can be Shabbos, Shabbat, or perhaps even



ly have to pronounce that word, because my mouth is usually full on Shabbos. So you're right. It seems clear that, for example the Kametz vowel, which looks like this and the Patach vowel, this guy over here , should have different sounds. Those who know grammar well will be able to differentiate between those, and also between these fellows sense that this letter and this letter be pronounced differently, as many communities do. But is the Ashkenazic pronunciation right? The Yeminite? Sepahrdic? Antarctican? Who really knows? If you're worried about the fact that the way you were taught to read Hebrew might not be grammatically correct, don't worry too much, as there are legitimate customs for most popular pronunciations (also, I'm pretty sure God will understand you either way). In modern day Israel, the country has adopted the Sephardic pronunciation, and many communities have followed suit, but you should probably follow whatever your family and
