




Nageela Fun Fact

PARSHAS CHAYEI

SARAH- All's well
that begins at a well.

- ABRAHAM FINDS THE PERFECT PLACE TO BURY SARAH, AND NAMES A GAS STATION AFTER ITS LOCATION.
- ABRAHAM PAYS 400 SILVER SHEKELS FOR THE BURIAL SPOT WHERE MOST OF OUR 'FOUNDING FATHERS AND MOTHERS' WOULD EVENTUALLY BE BURIED. INCIDENTALLY, 400 SILVER SHEKELS IS ALSO ABOUT THE PRICE OF A GALLON OF GAS IN CALIFORNIA (HENCE THE GAS STATION NAMING. OHHHHHH).



Hi Rabbi,

Is it proper for me to use my phone in a synagogue? What if I don't talk, but just text? What about just having it with me? What if I'm expecting an important call? What about a Siddur app?

Dear D StrachtShaun,

Do you WANT everyone to hate me? OK, this may be unpopular, but here we go:

I heard about a weird story that happened to a teenager named Millie recently. She was doing her usual thing, scrolling through her feed, liking and commenting on videos, when this rude adult walked up and grabbed the phone right out of her hand! Millie couldn't believe it! This person (who had some made up title like 'teacher' or something, had the nerve to tell Millie that she would fail her 'classes' (did you see my air quotes there?) and that she wasn't allowed to use her phone in this room called 'class' (again).

Yeah, I know it's an exaggerated story, but the point is real. Let's look at it this way.

Prayer is pretty serious business. In Jewish law, there's a whole lot of rules about how to pray, when to pray, where to pray, with whom to pray. For example, did you know that you shouldn't pray in front of a mirror? It looks like you're praying to yourself, and it's distracting besides. You're not supposed to pray on a raised platform unless it has a railing, because you might get distracted by fear of falling (so if you work for Cirque du Soleil, sorry, you'll have to come down first- I wonder of you can pray while in skydiving freefall, what can happen already?). We don't pray while riding an animal (not just because of the smell, but because you have to concentrate). And we certainly should not pray with a phone pinging, dinging, buzzing and reminding us of all the appointments, notifications and entertaining memes right there, calling to us.



if one Feinstein ruled that has to pray on an airplane, and he might be distracted by people passing by in the aisle, fasten seatbelt lights going on or peanuts being tossed at his head, it's better to sit for the entire prayer, rather than to stand and pray in a distracted way. Some of us have an easier time concentrating, but many of us get distracted rather easily (look, a pickle- I'm out). When we pray, we want to create a kind of bubble where we can genuinely feel connected to God. That's not gonna happen every time, but we should make the best setting for it. That's why we designate a building to pray in, rather than praying in a bus station (of course if you're in a bus station and it's time to pray you do the best with what you have).

Humans have always had a challenge of getting distracted, and phones are very helpful in the distraction category. 5 star review. Suuuuuuper distracting.

So I hope it's clear and obvious that having a phone out, checking notifications or responding to them is certainly a bad idea. Keeping your ringer on won't just distract you, but will also distract others. You don't wanna be that guy. And yes, people around you see you on your phone and it distracts them even if it's quiet. However, I find that even having my phone on vibrate in my pocket takes some of my mental bandwidth. It's like having too many windows open on your computer and getting that rainbow wheel of death. Personally, I'm a fan of shutting the phone off completely, and if possible having it in a separate room. Preferably in a fortified underground bunker with biometric security.

But my phone has a great Siddur app! Can I use that?

It's actually really amazing that phones have wonderful prayer and Torah apps, and we should make good use of them when traveling. It's super convenient to have a siddur in your pocket when you have to pray on the back of a tow truck. But if you're in a synagogue where there are real prayerbooks, it seems unnecessary to use a phone to pray. The same way a synagogue may not have pictures on the walls (unless they're above eye level) because they're distracting, and prayer-



books are not supposed to be illustrated for the same reason, a phone siddur app is no better than an illustrated prayerbook. Of course it should be self understood that if you have to pray with a phone, it should be on airplane mode and Do Not Disturb.

What if I'm expecting an important call? Stump the Rabbi isn't meant to render halachic decisions, so check with your Rabbi, but here's what I think. I'd venture to say that if you're expecting such an important call that you need to have your phone out, you should skip the syna-

gogue and pray alone. I don't think bringing a distraction into people's sincere prayers is excused by your desire to pray with a minyan.

I understand that this is an emotional topic for a lot of people, especially for teenagers, and nobody is perfect. As we mentioned earlier, the goal is to give ourselves the best tools we can to succeed as often as we can. We're big fans of scrolls, but not big on scrolling.
