but all the other ones. In our generation the majority of holidays are pretty much just a day off from work or school, and perhaps some of them involve a stuffed bird. Now imagine you live in a time and place where the majority of the people worship pagan religions, sacrificing llamas, burning incense and making odd gestures toward stone statues of frogs.

Hey, totally off topic, but it just occurred to me how much easier idol worship would be with a handy 3D printer. Umm, I'm not planning on 3D printing any gods, please don't worry. But I bet Abraham's Dad, Terach, would've loved that technology.

Speaking of people worshiping statues, there's an interesting rule I came across recently.

According to Jewish law (Mishna Avodah Zara 1:1), Jews may not do business with idol worshippers on

or around the day of the false gods' holidays. Why not? We're worried about a couple of things. First of all, if the Jew sells the idolater an animal. that very creature may be sacrificed

upon the altar of Barbie, or some equally nefarious deity.

Additionally, if the idolater gets a good deal, they'll pray and thank their patron god at the upcoming holiday, probably at their local Asheira Dollar Tree. We don't want to give them a reason to celebrate. If a Jew owes money to said pagan, it's also forbidden to repay that debt around the holiday celebration. Again, this makes perfect sense, because he'll certainly offer a sacrifice of several gummy worms to his god.

Hard to feel joy when you know you have debts to be paid.

We wait until just after Yom Kippur. What happens on Yom Kippur? We [are supposed to] cancel our debts. We get freedom from the heavy, heavy weight of the things we owe. Only then can we truly enjoy the holiday of joy.




NAGEELA NOTES:
