So... I'm not sure if that was the conversation between Naamah, and her husband, Noach. Yet it's kinda strange that they had no children until Noach was 500 years old, not too long (relatively) before the flood. This way, even if the children would be wicked (as Cham indeed was), they would not be old enough for their evil to cause them to die.


What if they'd be good people? Imagine if Noach had hundreds of years of good children and grandchildren. There would be




God programmed human beings to recognize truth when we hear it.
