

Dear Beyachad,


There's so much truth in what you said! You're right that God seems to encourage or emphasise differences between different groups of Jews, but it is NOT arbitrary. In order for our nation to be successful, it's necessary to have good farmers, talented businessmen, knowledgeable Torah teachers, fearless sea merchants, charismatic political leaders, mighty soldiers, fair judges, caring shepherds

and holy spiritual leaders. Each tribe brought a certain family talent to 'the table'

For example: The tribe of Simon was aggressive. They were people who 'got stuff done.' Asher was talented at growing fruit and enjoyed life. Issachar was known for Torah scholarship and Zebulun had ports and ships, working at trade. Joseph's descendants embody thriving under difficult circumstances. Judah is where our kings came from, because he represented personal and communal responsibilitu.

When the Jews camped in the desert during their 40 years of travel, they camped by tribe. When we entered Israel, as you mentioned, we lived by tribe. This set up allows each group to thrive in their skill set and allow for the greatest benefit to the whole nation. I'll admit there are challenges, too. The danger of harmony is that if you're off key, it sounds really bad. The danger of recognizing people's differences is that it can possibly lead

to disunity. But the answer isn't to just lump everyone together and erase our individual strengths and skills (ever read The Giver?) Our job is to recognize that although there may be other Jews playing different positions, we're all playing on the same team and we want each other to succeed. Have a Nageela Shabbat,
