
theism. With what can such a person be blessed?

Hi Rabbi,

I learned that people in ancient times had extremely long lifespans. I'm curious. Did animals back then also have long lifespans? Thanks.

Dear Lev,

Mesushelach, the oldest man ever, lived until 969. What's that in dog years? I'm fascinated by your question. Honestly, I've never thought about it, and I'm not aware of any Torah sources directly discussing it. So let's use our brains and figure this out together.

In order to determine if animals in ancient times had elongated lifespans, we first need to examine how and why people had such long lives. There are a few different opinions on why this happened.

Opinion 1 (Maimonides): Most people did not have exceptionally long lives. There are people the Torah mentions who lived 4,5,600 or even 900 or more years, but they were the unique special people who God miraculously gave longer life spans because of the important contributions they would make to the world. According to this idea, since most people lived normal length lives, animals would also have lived normal length lives.
