Why is it that men and women have a different number of commandments? I think men actually have more mitzvot than women do. Why is that a thing? Is there a certain type of commandment that one has and not the other?

Do you remember last week when we spoke about harmony? Of course you do! We mentioned that in order for a team to function properly, there need to be people playing all positions. You can't have a team of all quarterbacks, pitchers, or goalies. The same thing applies to music bands, businesses and even schools. Everyone plays a different role and has special rules for that role. It would be totally weird for your teacher to skip class in order to cook the school lunch, just as it would be odd for the rock band's drummer to grab an electric guitar and start playing. Not just odd really, it would be wrong for his job. All players are vital to the success of the mission, and one isn't more important than the next.

There are many different categories of

people in the world who have different roles and therefore different sets of mitzvos. For example, there's a family of Jews called Kohanim who have a set of rules all for themselves. Because their job was to serve in the Holy Temple, it is forbidden for them to come into contact with a dead body, forbidden for them to drink alcohol during the service, and they even had restrictions on whom they could marry.

Men and women, too, have different jobs, and different skill sets. Perhaps the most important of all responsibilities any human can have is to care for their children. For Jews, it gets kicked up a notch. Our children are the future continuity of the Jewish people, of our tradition from Sinai, and of thousands of years of Jewish families.
