Mirror, mirror on the wall. Who's the weirdest of them all?

I think that's how it goes. Mirrors are very interesting creatures. Fine, so they're not creatures, but they do seem to carry a lot of life. Seen through a mirror, you can detect wondrous events like rainstorms, birthdays, puppies, pillow fights, pickle juice chugging contests... one Norwegian town even built giant mirrors to reflect the sun, because they had no direct sunlight for a few months a year. In previous weeks, you've explained in general why we pray- keeping a connection to God, and as a way to reflect on what we want and why. Let's try this: somebody steals. They get caught. They go to court. The judge and jury send them to jail. Is that just- is it fair?

Hmmm. Assuming that the judge and jury are honest, don't take bribes and follow the laws, I assume it is just.

Stump the Rabbi

Nope.

' Really? Rabbi? You don't believe in laws and courts?

Whoa. I didn't say that. I do believe in law and courts and that criminals should go to jail. It still isn't really just.

Why not?

The criminal may be getting the justice he deserves, but what about his family? His kids have done nothing wrong, and yet they will suffer greatly. It may still be necessary, and society needs laws and police and jails to function, but that doesn't make it just. Human justice is limited—we can never pretend that anything we do will be perfect justice. Every situation in the world is like throwing a pebble in a pond, and the ripples spread and affect many people. Sometimes unjustly, but there's not much we can do about it.

But God? Oh, God is way different!

God's justice is absolutely perfect. He's really good at math and logistics, and God makes sure that anything that happens to anyone fits in perfectly with the plan of what is supposed to happen to

[One important factor to understand is that no human is ever perfect and without mistakes, and God can decide how and where to provide the corrective discomfort for those mistakes- that's a loaded topic for a different week]. If someone near to us suffers, and that makes us sad or uncomfortable, that means we're also imperfect, or else we wouldn't experience that discomfort. Makes sense so far? Good.

When we pray, even for someone else, we improve ourselves and build up our spiritual bank account. We do this in a few ways. Firstly, as we've mentioned in previous weeks, prayer is a way of strengthening our connection and relationship with God. If we're stronger and closer to God, those around us are less likely to suffer. Also, when we pray, we focus on how everything is in God's hands (literally most of prayer is about how God is the source of every blessing and success in the world). Doing this certainly levels us up. The

more we level up, the more blessing it brings to those around us. If we're connected enough to a person to pray for their success or recovery, that means their state affects us greatly. If we level up, they receive more blessing! Cool, huh?

So think about other people in trouble, whether it's a relative with a health problem, refugees from a war, or a lonely person looking for a partner in life. Think about it until you feel a bit uncomfortable. Then ask God to help. You'd be surprised at the results.
