Talmud every week!" The second fellow counters, "Well, my rabbi is so holy that angels visit his shabbos meal, just to help serve the matzah ball soup!" Not to be beaten the third guy says, "That aint nothin! My rabbi once got a really bad deal on an online purchase..."

Crickets. You don't get it? I know. It really wasn't funny at all. It made no sense. Why in the world would anyone think that getting overcharged on a business deal would be a meaningful religious experience? I didn't think so. Yet this seems to be what happened with our great forefather Abraham. You may have heard the Abraham was given ten challenges to help him achieve greatness. You might not know what his ten challenges were. The truth is that not all opinions agree on which

incidents in his long life qualify. Many commentators agree that the final and most difficult was the saga we read last week, when he believed he would have to slaughter his beloved son. Yet there's another opinion.

The talmud (Bava Basra 15b)

quotes Stan who was a fan of Abraham. Sorry, I wrote that wrong. No offense to Stan who is probably a great guy, the talmud is quoting Satan, who is not Stan, even though the baristas at Starbucks ALWAYS write his name wrong on the cup. Satan tells God, "I've flown around to everyone in the world, and I haven't found anyone as faithful as Abraham... couldn't find a burial place for Sarah until he got charged 400 silver shekels, and yet did not doubt You." If I was Abraham, I'm not sure I would want my testimonial to come from Satan-I might prefer Stan. Rabbeinu Yonah counts this as the final of the ten challenges. Anyway, does it strike you as odd that when Satan wants to give an example of Abraham's reliability and steadfast nature that he refers to Abraham's getting ripped off rather than, oh, I don't know, agreeing to sacrifice HIS SON? Or giving himself a circumcision at age 99? Or having his wife taken from him TWICE? Nope. It's like, he missed the Black Friday deals and paid retail. Wow, holy man!

There's one major difference between this test and the others. God told Abraham to sacrifice his son. It was a clear command, born from a prophetic vision. Difficult as it may have been, he knew with zero

at something more basic because it doesn't SEEM like a major religious issue. There are Jews who would sacrifice their lives rather than convert to another religion, yet those same people would get angry, speak lashon hara or act dishonestly in a disagreement with another person, because they

don't realize it's also a divinely granted challenge.

This is Abraham's greatness. He identified every challenge in life, even the ones that come in the form of an aggressive salesman,

as God's trials. That's our job, too. Annoying sibling? Test from God. Boooooring teacher? It's a life challenge! Under the weather? Lost your wallet? Too much spam? Lost some followers? Scraped your knee? Recyou opportunities to help you

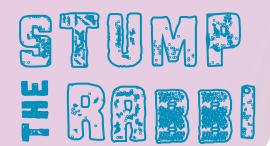

# SATURDAY NIGHT PROPHET

Why do we sing about Eliyahu on Saturday night? Is it just a random nice song, or is there some bigger reason for it?

Dear Hanna V,

Lots of people sing J Eliyahu Hanavi J at Havdallah, or during their after-Shabbos meal. Maybe they just like the song? Nah. There's a reason. There are very few things we 'just do' without a pretty good reason. To answer this question, let's remind ourselves who Elijah the Prophet was (let's just call him Eliyahu from now on), and what he did. The first thing to remember is that he was a prophet. Prophets are awesome. God communicated directly with these special people both because of their own awesomeness and because there's an important message the Jewish people need to hear.

In Eliyahu's case, a very large portion of the Jewish population had been negatively influenced by the then king and queen, Achav and Izevel. Many, many of them had begun to worship false gods, which is seriously uncool. Some Jews worshiped God properly, and ALSO worshiped other Gods which is just like, "MAKE UP YOUR MIND!" its every bris (we even save him a seat) and is also associated with Havdalah, to testify to the Jewish people's eternal connection to God. There are a number of beautiful messages here. Perhaps one of them is that Eliyahu's complaints came after the Jews reached a high level of connection to God but then fell. Each Shabbos we once again reach a high level of connection, but it's hard to carry that into the week. Mentioning Eliyahu at Havdallah reminds us of how important it is not to fall after we've reached high. Another explanation is that Shabbos is a taste of the next world, so once Shabbos ends, we take comfort by reminding ourselves that Eliyahu. who is the harbinger of Mashiach (do you have any idea what a harbinger is? Yeah, me neither, but it sounds like the right word to say) will come soon. " [ Soon in our days, may he come to us, with Mashiach the son of David. 5"
