Hi Rabbi.

In today's Dvar Torah you wrote about counting Jews. You mentioned that we don't count Jews by their heads, whatever that means. Why don't we count Jews? Why were they able to count with coins? Is there a legal way that it's OK to count? I mean, how can you figure out if you have a minuan without counting?

Dear Minn Ian.

That is impossible! What? Now I'm the confused one. How could you possibly have read today's dvar Torah, thought of a question, sent me the question, all on time to be published in the same episode of Nageela Shabbos? Time machine? Or maybe you're actually me. Hmmm, I'll have to think about that one. And now to your guestion.

God tells Moshe that he should count the Jews by using coins so that there should not be a plague. Not having plagues sounds like fun. Do you remember those pre-plague days? Could you imagine all the Jews walking around in the desert with masks and hand sanitizer? Here's the reason I remember for not wanting to count Jews 'by their heads' meaning, directly counting each person.

Sometimes we are worthy of blessing. However, not all of us always live up to the high, high, high standards God has for us. In case we are not 100% up to standard, it's a good idea to be included in the group called "The Jewish People." I like to think of it like flower paintings. If you paint a landscape with thousands of flowers in it, its really fine if not every flower has every detail perfectly painted. In fact, most painters of landscapes don't add much detail to the individual flowers, and like to step back and admire the complete work. But if you're painting a 12 foot portrait of a single rose, you best be making sure that every single inch of that flower is done with precision and beauty. We are all a part of the Jewish people. And it's better to be a part then apart. When we count people by the head', God looks at them as individuals. In that case, they don't get the benefits of being part of the greater Jewish nation.

How did coins help? There are two opinions. One possibility is that since the count was indirect, counting coins instead of people, there's no problem. In the Holy Temple they did something similar, counting fingers instead of people. Another possible explanation is that giving coins, because it's generous and counts as charity, cancels out any badness that would come from counting in person. So according to this idea, it would be ok to count people

Stump the Rabb; directly if it's for a mitzvah purpose.

When it comes to counting people for a minuan, there are usually three ways to get an accurate count without counting the people directly:

It's OK to count in your head, without speaking them out loud (which ironically means we can't count heads, but we can count in heads).

Each person gives a million dollar donation, and you just count how many million you have (a million minyan).

You can find a sentence with ten words and use that to count. This is the method I prefer. Some people like to use the blessing for bread which has ten words: Baruch Atah Hashem, Elokeinu, Melech Haolam, Hamotzi Lechem Min Haaretz. You can also use this one: Scintillate, scintillate, diminutive

asteroid; how I ponder your true identity, or "I will never say never, I will fight till forever." Maybe just stick with the bread blessing Regardless of the details, the message for all of us is that in order to get the most blessing out of life, we should stick together with the rest of the Jewish people. A part, not apart.
