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

Dear Sheila,

Speaking of questions, I have one for you: How do you make a hot dog stand?

You take away its chair.

Now I think I may have permanently scared you away from the concept of questions. Let's discuss.

You're young and you probably haven't had many job interviews. Often, near the end of the interview, the interviewer will ask, "Do you have any questions for me?" Experts will tell you that it's a good idea to have questions to ask (I consider myself an expert on this because I spent 24 seconds searching on Google) for a few reasons: 1. It shows you're interested in the job or topic. 2. It's a chance to learn more about the job. 3. It makes a good first impression.

Does Judaism agree?

At the Passover seder, the haggadah- the telling of the story- is always done in a question and answer format. You're probably familiar with the 4 questions. Even if you're having your seder alone, you're supposed to ask yourself questions and answer them! That's because the best way to find the truth is through the question and answer method (and the second best way to find truth is to ask Siri). A wise man once said, "The only thing better than a good answer is a good question, for it will lead to many answers." OK, I might have made that up.

I heard of a great Rosh Yeshiva (head of a Rabbinical School) who would spend many hours preparing his lectures. Yet he encouraged his students to challenge him. He told them (paraphrased) "If you hear my lectures and you're not confused or bothered by something I said, that means you didn't fully understand it."

It's important to keep in mind that there are two types of questions. You can ask a question that implies respect and a desire to learn ("I believe that God is good, so why do

bad things happen to good people?"), or a question that shows you think something is ridiculous ("Were you even thinking when you said that? Can you count?"). The first type is part of the process of learning. The second type is just rude. So yes, questions and curiosity are an extremely important aspect of the learning process. Now, you don't feel curious and it bothers you.

Though I just wrote about how important questioning is in the learning process, there are different types of learners. Some people are naturally less curious, and do better with simply absorbing information. Some people are more experiential learners. The key question is, "Are you still learning? (see, I used a guestion) Does the learning and information interest and excite you?" If yes, then I wouldn't worry too much. You're going through a stage in your learning process where you're absorbing, and eventually, you'll likely go back to asking (which will help you understand the stuff you are learning now much better). If the answer is no, then that might mean you've temporarily lost your excitement. What do you do if you've lost interest in learning Torah? That's a great question, and as I said, questions are better than answers, so till next time...Enjoy the hot dog stand.
