Dear Nick Names.

LASTTIME WEDISCUSSED THE CONCEPT THAT JEWISH NAMES IDENTIFY US AS PROUD JEWS. THIS WEEK WE'LL FOCUS ON WHAT A JEWISH NAME MEANS INDIVIDUALLY.

I think there are two more special aspects of having a Jewish name (okay, well, two that I'm going to mention right now, anyway):

People pick names for all kinds of strange reasons. A celebrity naming his kid North, because

There's nothing wrong with funky Yet there's something names. meaningful special about a Most Jewish names are name. taken from the Torah. They are representation of some of the greatest people ever to live. Idon't know about you, but I'd prefer my son be named for the inspirational King David, than Quinoa. other Jewish names are chosen because of their beautiful and hopeful meaning. In biblical times, pretty much all names given were a hope and a prayer for the future of the child. The biblical name Noah represented the hope that the world would finally achieve a pleasant state, after the turmoil of the first few generations. The name Joseph means to increase, a prayer for increased blessing and success in all things. The Hebrew language, as the original language of creation, and the language of the Torah, is a wonderful way to express such a prayer.

There's an ancient Jewish tradition that when naming a

child, the parents have a flash of divine inspiration- a bit of prophecy. That name is the name they're destined to have and may tell much about their personality.

Aside from the meanings of the actual names, there's an accepted Jewish custom to name children after relatives. One of our core values is the importance of linking to our past. Everything we know to be good and right and true comes from our ancestors, teachers and parents. Naming a child after someone in our family's past, ties an unbreakable knot between past and future.

Sephardic tradition, babies named for special living are relatives, such as grandparents. In Ashkenazic tradition, names are only given for relatives who have passed on. Either way, this beautiful custom means that the child has more than just a word that people use to get his or her attention. A connection to the previous generations is now a part of that person. I'm named after my great grandfather. It's meaningful to me that my name is a link to my past, and someday, way down the line, a descendant of mine will carry that link into the future.

what if I have a Jewish name and an English name? Do I have to use my Jewish name? If people call me by my English name, what's the point of the Jewish name?

Lots of people have lots of things they're called. People have nicknames, titles and job descriptions. Robert might be

called Bob, Peter might be called George Herman Spidey, answer to "the Babe" and Bill could be referred to as Coach. The name that really matters is the one you use for the most important occasions in your life. marriage and death. Jewish names are used for these important occasions. When a Jewish is born, they receive their Jewish name. At his wedding, his Jewish name will appear on the Ketubah. the marriage document, and when he passes on, the Jewish name will appear on the gravestone, be mentioned in the "kel maleh" memorial prayer, and thought of when Kaddish is recited.

Many people choose to have a Jewish name and also have an English name on their official identification. It often makes it easier in school or business if everyone can pronounce your name! An old friend of mine uses the biblical name Nachshon. When he was in high school, the teacher ended up calling him Nachos! In fact, my own children have English names to go along with their Hebrew names.

Source:

You should not give your money wth usury, and with interest you should not give food... (Book of Vayikra chapter 25 verse 27 and Book of Devraim 23:20).

Details:

- · Even though it is a mitzvah to lend money to someone who needs help, the lender may not demand that the borrower pay back any more than he borrowed
- Even if the borrower wants to pay



This mitzvah only applies to lending to or borrowing from other Jews. This is why it's OK to get a bank loan or mortgage

there is nothing that sends the message of values more than sacrifice.

Vour parents will tell you to be generous, but when you see them giving even when it's hard, that means more. Your parents might talk about the importance of Jewish holidays, and it will make an impression, but not nearly as strongly as when they give up an important meeting, or a show they really want to see to celebrate that holiday. Hearing about how important it is to learn has a greater effect when your parents your put aside things they want in

order to facilitate their own (or your) learning.

Then a leader is willing to sacrifice his life to stand for God's honor, their children and grandchildren get the message loud and clear. This is why Betzalel was the perfect candidate to construct the Mishkan, the house made for giving honor to God. He learned from the most powerful teacher- the self sacrifice of his grandfather.

then you have kids, what values will they know are important to you? In what ways will you show them the importance of these values?
