On Dec 23, 2003, Brett Favre played one of the best games of his life. This hall of fame QB and 3 time MVP came out in a Monday Night Football game against the Oakland Raiders and threw for nearly 400 yards. In the first half alone he reached 311 yards and 4 touchdowns, astonishingly good numbers. But that's not why this day is remembered by Green Bay Packers fans. It was one day after Favre's father passed away from a sudden heart attack. This performance was a powerful display of resilience and grit, of the power of spirit and of clarifying priorities.

Really misplaced, damaging priorities.

Brett Favre is held up as the example of stepping up in the face of emotional turmoil, and there's no doubt it shows that effectively, but at what cost? Judaism teaches that a human's soul is connected to God, we're not merely organisms; mammals running around on Earth playing some sort of game. Because of this, we take the end of life seriously, and when a close relative passes away, we shut everything down to mourn properly. For the first little while until burial, even mitzvos are skipped. No prayer, no tefillin. Certainly no televised football matches.

TBH, I'm not here to judge Brett Favre.
He's not bound by Jewish law, and I don't know what his emotional needs were on that day. But in the generous praise of his actions, I see a lack of appreciation for the seriousness of life and death. Let's imagine he had made a different decision, and gone to spend time with his family, mourning and remembering. What do you think the chances are that there would be a media parade praising his choice to have moral strength to mourn rather than perform for the entertainment industry? Yeah, I don't think so either.

Now let's flip this to a scenario where instead of a football game, we're discussing a really Earth shattering event. Maybe Superman is facing off against some alien invasion and he's the only one who can stop it, and then he finds out his father has passed away (I know, I know, Jor- El died years before; work with me here). In this case, of course he should put aside his intense emotions and even his appropriate honor for the deceased, and get on with the whole saving the world thing.

We see this split very clearly in the Torah. standard Kohen- one of those guys from the family of Aaron, tasked with doing all the temple service and stuff- does not serve when he's lost a close relative. Even though there are few things more important than the service of a Kohen (dare I suggest, even football?), that all gets put aside for mourning. The Kohen will just have to miss his Monday night Terumas Hadeshen. But the story changes dramatically when we talk about the Kohen Gadol. He's who you might call the chief Kohen, High priest, Sorcerer Supreme-something like that. His service is so important, so vital, that even during the most intense stage of grief, when the burial has not yet taken place, he may not abandon his service. He plays on, and yes, he displays resilience and grit to do so.

Until it's meal time. Even the Kohen Gadol does not eat from the offerings when he's mourning, because his eating doesn't require his complete focus in the same way that his service does.

Priorities can sometimes be a tricky thing to determine. If you're just working with nothing but your own self- driven GPS, it's hard to know that you're making the right choice. For



Brett Favre, playing Football was a good thing. He earned a living for his family and entertained millions. Yet on that day in 2003, it conflicted with a different good, and perhaps one that was greater. Our job is to always try to select the good that is genuinely greater, as guided by the Torah, and by the info we get from the Fortress of Solitude (I'm referring to prayer, of course).




